

## Part 4: Redefining What a Relationship Actually Is



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A relationship isn't defined by frequency of contact or physical closeness. It's defined by intention. By mutual clarity. By the willingness to show up emotionally, even when it's uncomfortable. Anything less may be a connection—but it's not a relationship.
